***Moral**

- Being concerned with or pertaining to the principles of "right" conduct or the difference between right and wrong.
- Conforming to accepted or established principles of "right" conduct or virtues.
- Actions based upon principles of "right" conduct rather than law; having a moral obligation.

***Ethical**

- Pertaining to a body of moral principles or values held by or governing a culture, group, or individual.
- A system or set of moral principles.
- The rules governing a class of actions or particular group, culture, profession.



When considering the difference between ethics and morals, it may be helpful to consider a criminal defense lawyer. Though the lawyer's personal moral code likely finds murder immoral and reprehensible, ethics demand the accused client be defended as vigorously as possible, even when the lawyer knows the party is guilty and that a freed defendant would potentially lead to more crime.
